Monday: By honouring human dignity / Honorent la dignité humaine

Tuesday: By caring for creation / Prennent soin de la création

Wednesday: By responding to the poverties in our world / Luttent contre les pauvretés

Thursday: By serving in solidarity / Servent en solidarité

Friday: By living as peacemakers / Vivent en artisans de paix



This year our school will be creating a **Pilgrims of Hope** canvas for classroom prayer tables and will engage classes in guided meditation "Hope is your Anchor" while painting the canvas. Classrooms will

incorporate this year's Catholic Education Week symbols: hope, dove, light, lotus, stars, bible verses, CEW Jubilee colours, and anchor. During Catholic Education Week our school will collect classroom canvas and display them as a mosaic at a central location for families to enjoy during our open-door event.

Faith Formation:

Forming ourselves in our Catholic faith is a foundational element in helping each of us understand and live in the example of Christ.



Faith formation is a process of journeying into a deeper relationship with Jesus. The initial primary points of reference are our own lives and the Bible. At St. Clare, staff members work collaboratively to create various opportunities for spiritual reflection for our students in their classrooms, through liturgies, shared stories, as well as during Religion and Family Life curriculum. Faith Formation is ongoing in all we do. Collectively, we pray before lunch, at school liturgies and school masses. Clubs such as Youth Faith Ambassadors, Wellness Warriors, Eco Club, and class Buddy System also give our students the opportunity to build on their faith in a variety of ways. Staff deepen their faith formation as Adult Faith Ambassadors. They provide both staff and school community support for spiritual development

and Gospel Action. They are part of the Larger Dufferin-Peel community of Adult Faith Ambassadors who gather throughout the year in reflective retreats, and liturgies to celebrate and promote our Catholic virtues and gospel teaching. These leaders continue to encourage each other and support others to prepare celebrations, plan masses, provide opportunities for student and staff prayer and to organize community outreach activities. St. Clare staff promote a culture of high expectations and a positive school climate that supports well-being and uphold the principals of equity and human rights with our Teacher/Student Mentor Projects. St. Clare creates faith formation connections for wellbeing, learning and leading in a positive climate as demonstrated in our various virtue initiatives as well as creating a healthy social space that includes student voice where all learners feel safe, involved, and supported. St. Clare staff are making a continuous effort to connect and know our learners. St. Clare promotes a safe school environment, as well as promoting coping strategies, to reduce negative effects. At St. Clare School, we recognize parents are integral in the development of their child's faith. In addition, we have monthly virtual visits from the Rosary Apostolates. Faith formation at St. Clare includes the well-being, learning and leading of our students. During the season of Advent, we hold an Advent activity. During Lent, we hold the Stations of the Cross presentation for parents.

Recognizing Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations:

Framed by the Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations (OCSGE), our graduates will be effective communicators, reflective thinkers, lifelong learners, collaborative contributors, caring family members, responsible citizens and discerning believers formed in the Catholic faith community.



St. Clare's focus is on creating Catholic Conditions for well-being and a commitment to realizing the Ontario Catholic Schools Graduate Expectations. At St. Clare, we model and support the Ontario Catholic Graduation Expectations. Students work towards becoming effective, reflective, selfdirected collaborative caring and responsible children. We model, teach, and imbed these qualities in all we do at school. The Ontario Catholic Graduation Expectations are present in student's

agendas, on display in the front foyer and on the school website. Staff were provided the OCGE in student friendly language to support student development in the classroom. We are mindful at St. Clare; we are working towards effective instruction that respectfully challenges all learners, within a caring community, to take risks, to experience success and to achieve the Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations.

- <u>Discerning believers formed in the Catholic tradition</u> we celebrate the signs and sacred mystery of God's presence through word, sacrament, prayer, forgiveness, reflection, and moral living. Some examples of ways to demonstrate this includes knowing the story of our faith, participating in the sacramental life, reflecting on God's word, seeking to be in communion with God and others, respecting our faith traditions, integrating faith in our lives, and recognizing that we all have weaknesses, and we have forgiveness to help us through them.
- <u>Effective communicators</u> we speak, write, and listen honestly and sensitively, responding critically in light of gospel value. Examples of how we accomplish this include listening, understanding, using, and reading oral and written materials effectively, presenting information and ideas clearly, and writing and speaking fluently in Canada's official languages.



- <u>Reflective and creative thinkers</u> we solve problems and make responsible decisions with an informed moral conscience for the common good. Examples of this includes creating, adapting, and evaluating news ideas, thinking reflectively and creatively to evaluate situations and solve problems and making good decisions.
- <u>Self-directed, responsible, lifelong learners</u> we develop and demonstrate or full Godgiven potential. We can accomplish this through demonstrating flexibility and adaptability, setting appropriate goals and priorities for our work and personal life, and participating in a balanced and healthy lifestyle.
- <u>Collaborative contributors</u> we find meaning, dignity and vocation in work which respects the rights of all and contribute to the common good. Examples include working effectively as a team member, and respecting the rights, responsibilities and contributions of ourselves and others.
- <u>Caring family members</u> we attend to our family, school, parish, and the wider community. This involves relating to family members in a loving, compassionate, and respectful manner in our school and home families.
- Responsible citizen we give witness to Catholic social teaching by promoting peace, justice, and the sacredness of human life. Examples of achieving this includes accepting accountability for one's own actions, seeking and granting forgiveness, respecting, and affirming diversity, respecting the environment, and using its resources wisely and contributing to the common good.

Celebrating Virtues:

A virtue is a habit or established capacity to perform good actions according to a moral standard. When we practice these virtues, we strengthen them and thereby make the presence of God more and more visible in the world around us.



The month-at-a-time format of our Virtues program provides vocabulary and milestones for a continuous school-wide conversation about how we can creatively maintain and strengthen a safe school community that reflects the values and teachings of Jesus Christ. The Virtues are shared monthly in our school newsletter, on our school twitter feed, over daily announcements in our student agendas as well as posted on our website and our school monthly. Virtual Virtue Assemblies happen monthly at the beginning of the month. Classroom teachers display the

virtues on their prayer tables that are reflective of the liturgical season. Staff recognize, monthly, those students who demonstrate Virtues in Action.

Visible Signs of our Faith:

Through symbol and service, we are instruments of God's love whose work within our communities stands as a witness to our faith.



The front foyer and main office of the school welcome students, staff, parents, and visitors to a faith-filled community. These are visual reminders of our common heritage and the liturgical seasons. St. Clare's artwork in the front foyer and alter dominate the main entrance of the school. Crucifix of the Risen Lord, bible, and prayer tables with liturgical cloths, classroom rosary and bulletin boards are on display for students, visitors and staff as visual reminders of our Catholic beliefs, faith, and traditions. Students' artistic endeavors are reflective of the Liturgical seasons and

highlighted in the classrooms and throughout the school. St. Clare has a Peace Garden at the front of the school. and garden rocks where staff and students can reflect, pray the rosary, and share in a liturgy. Our classrooms regularly visit this garden and staff use and to support their teaching.
